By the end of Year 6 I will have added to my sticky Geography knowledge to include:

Locational Knowledge

Using an atlas or digital map to locate countries and cities including Mexico City and targets bombed in Britain during WW2, e.g. Hull.

Mexico has the second highest migration out of the country, after India.

The tropical rainforests of the world are being destroyed in favour of palm-oil plantations with Indonesia and Malaysia being the major areas being affected.



Place Knowledge

Mexico City is the largest city in Mexico and is the most populated city in North America.

Mexico City is the 7th highest city in the world and this caused some athletes problems with breathing during the Olympic games in 1968.

London experienced huge amounts of bombing in the Blitz during WW2 and large portions had to be rebuilt.

Industrial cities such as Sheffield and Birmingham were heavily bombed due to the industry based there and ports such as Hull were also bombed.



Human and Physical Geography

The human geographical features of a town or city can be linked to the local industry e.g. Hull has a port for fishing and exports.

Deforestation of the tropical Rainforests of the world is contributing to Global Warming.

Farmers are planting palm oil trees in place of tropical rainforest as there is a global demand for cheap manufacturing materials and they are supplying demand.



Geographical skills and fieldwork

Maps can be produced to show specific information e.g. the 'Bombing Britain' map shows the sites of major bomb attacks in the UK in WW2.

There are patterns in e.g. temperature and rainfall and using maps can help predict conditions in unfamiliar countries and cities.

Scale maps can be drawn of areas to show differing features such as rainfall.

Information can be gathered from a familiar area and plotted on a scale map for others to use.
